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Community professionals tutor at GUC

GUC tutors prepared for the new academic year, attending the first Community of Practice for 2016.

While upskilling themselves on small group work, Director Natalie Nelmes highlighted that GUC had been able to attract people who played very important roles in the community to tutor GUC students.

"These tutors hail from all different professions from the Regional Manager of the Community Alcohol Drug Service to a City of Greater Geraldton Project Manager who managed the \$34mil Verita Road project, to a science specialist in a local school," she said.

"Having tutors of the calibre we have been able to attract allows GUC to run the expanded range of programs that we now have at the Centre and deliver an excellent standard of academic support that is particularly relevant to our community," she said.

"This is evident in the outstanding success rate of our students."

The GUC model of supported distance education sees students accessing online curriculum from GUC's university partners as well as attending the Centre for a two hour tutorial each week or an intensive block of tuition in each unit of study.

"It's a model where we really see the best and brightest of our community, nurturing the future professionals of our community," Natalie said. "We are indeed in safe hands."
